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MONTH OF THE MILITARY CHILD INFO SHEET

The month of April celebrates the Month of the Military Child. **MOMC** is the <u>acronym</u> for Month of the Military Child. The military uses a lot of acronyms-MREs stands for Meals Ready to Eat. What is an acronym? A word formed from the initial letters of other words. Think about acronyms you may have in your classroom, or in your school.



PURPLE-UP for Military KIDS Day

- Purple is the color associated with the Month of the Military Child.
- The Dandelion is the official flower of the Military Child because Dandelions are a unique flower. They have the ability to grant wishes, they are resilient and they grow wherever the wind takes them.
- Military Brat is a term of affection that refers to a military child. Many military children refer to themselves as a "military brat." The term originated in 1921, British Regiment Attached Travelers (as they were called) traveled abroad with British troops. BRAT soon became a term used only for the children of those troops. The name was adopted elsewhere, including the United States.
- There are approximately 1.2 million children whose parents serve in the United States military. That is the same number of people who live in the states of Vermont and Wyoming combined!
- On average, military children move with their parents approximately every 3 years to a different duty station. Sometimes they live overseas, in places like Germany, Japan, Italy or South Korea.


