MATERIALS:	Computer/laptop; internet (with access to YouTube); Smart Board; copies of the Comprehension Questions for <i>Be Kind</i> ; copies of the Oath of Kindness Writing Practice; copies of The Ripple Effect of Kindness and the Greater Good; copies of Coloring Sheet National Salute to Veteran Patients Project
Engage: Hook the students	Think/Pair/Share Activity- Pair the students with a partner. Explain the T/P/S directions. The students will think of their answer, get with their partner, and share their answer. Ask students: What does the word "kindness" mean? Allow students time to answer the question. T/P/S Question: How do you feel when someone is not kind to you? How do you feel when someone treats you with kindness? Discussion: What are some ways you can show kindness to others? Ask students to share examples of being kind. <b>Explain:</b> Being kind to others is intentional, in other words you decide or choose to be kind to others. It is done with purpose. The phrase "a belief in the greater good" means you believe in doing what is best for everyone, <u>not</u> in doing what is best for just <b>you</b> .
<b>Explore:</b> Students make sense of a concept through observations.	Play the YouTube read aloud book, <i>Be Kind</i> , Author-Pat Zietlow Miller, Illustrator-Jen Hill, <u>https://youtu.be/kAo4-2UzgPo?si=glrj8Jao_wxrlgS9</u> Hand out the Comprehension Questions for the book, <i>Be Kind</i> . Allow students time to complete the assignment. Hand out the Oath of Kindness Writing Practice. Read it aloud. Allow students time to complete the writing assignment. Explain the definition of ripple effect, when an event or action creates a ripple effect, it causes several other events to happen one after the other. Put students in groups of 3-4. Hand out The Ripple Effect of Kindness and the Greater Good Activity. Allow students time to complete the activity. Hand out the Coloring Sheet National Salute to Veteran Patients. Allow students time to complete the coloring sheet. Find your nearest Veteran hospital or facility, mail the coloring sheets! Print project completion certificates <u>here.</u>
<b>Explain:</b> Teacher introduces formal vocabulary and language to students.	kindness greater good intentional narrator purpose ripple effect
Elaborate: Students apply what they have learned.	Confirm understanding of a text read aloud or information presented orally or through other media by asking and answering questions about key details.
Evaluate: assessment.	Teachers will select which activities to use as formal/informal assessments.

### Comprehension Questions Be Kind

1. What happened to Tanisha at the beginning of the story that made her sad? Tanisha spilled grape juice all over her new dress.

2. Do you think Tanisha was so upset because she spilled the juice on her dress, or because other children laughed and made fun of her after she spilled the juice? Answers will vary slightly.

3. The narrator says she wanted to laugh at Tanisha too, but she did not laugh. What reason does she give for not laughing?

The narrator says she did not laugh because her mother told her to always be kind.

4. When the narrator tells Tanisha her favorite color is purple, what does Tanisha do? Tanisha ran into the hall.

Why do you think Tanisha did that? Answers will vary. Explain that Tanisha may have been embarrassed because she spilled her juice, or Tanisha may have thought the narrator was making fun of her.

5. How do you think you would have felt if you were Tanisha?

Answers will vary.

6. How would you have felt if you were the narrator?

Answers will vary.

7. What are some ways the narrator thinks that she could have responded to Tanisha differently?

The narrator could have given Tanisha a napkin, or loaned Tanisha her sweatshirt or spilled juice on her clothing.

How would you have responded to Tanisha? Answers will vary.

8. The narrator asks the question, "What does it mean to be kind anyway?" What are some ways the narrator says that you can show kindness?

The narrator says you can show kindness by giving, helping, paying attention, saying nice things about someone, helping to pick up litter, and being polite.

9. The narrator says sometimes being kind can be hard. What examples does she give?

The narrator says it can be hard to remain kind when you are trying to teach someone something you already know how to do and to speak up when someone is being bullied.

When do you think it would be hard to show kindness?

Answers will vary.

10. What does the narrator say can happen to small acts of kindness? The narrator says small acts of kindness can grow-from your school, to your community, to your country, and throughout the entire world.
