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#### **Honesty and Integrity Concrete Poem**

**Concrete poetry**—sometimes also called 'shape poetry'—is poetry whose visual appearance matches the topic of the poem. The words form shapes which illustrate the poem's subject as a picture, as well as through their literal meaning. **Outline Poems-**A common way to make the visual structure reflect the subject of the poem is to fill an outline shape that relates to the topic of the poem. The words in this type of poetry, unlike traditional poetry, do not have to rhyme.
