

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Oral Questions for Talk and Work It Out

- 3. Why is it important to "get along" with people? Answers will vary.
- 4. Why does the narrator say it is okay to not always agree with people? The narrator says it is okay for people to have different ideas.
- 5. What does the narrator do if something really bothers him? If something really bothers him, he makes a choice to work it out.
- 6. What does the narrator say that he can do to work it out?


He can take a big breath to calm down.

He can take time to think about what he will do.

He can talk to the person to tell them how he feels.

- 7. If you have a problem with someone and you decide you want to "Talk it Out", what 4 steps does the author give you to follow?
- 1. Talk about the problem.
- 2. Listen to understand.
- 3. Think of ways to solve it.
- 4. Choose the best plan.
- 8. Why do you think it is so important to listen to the other person's point of view? Answers will vary, but should include any of the following:
- 1. You can listen and learn how the other person feels.
- 2. You can learn about how the other person sees the problem.
- 3. You can repeat what you hear them say to show you understand and care.
- 4. You can be polite and friendly when you talk about the problem, it feels good to be heard and understood.
- 5. You can ask the other person for their ideas to help solve the problem.
- 9. If you still need help to solve the problem, what can you do? If you still need help to solve the problem, you can ask a grown up.
- 10. If you cannot find a solution that everyone likes, what can you do? If you cannot find a solution that everyone likes you can show respect.
- 11. How does caring about the feelings of others help solve problems? If you care about the feelings of others, you can usually solve problems you may have with them.

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
