

#### 2008

What does the reader learn about Nya at the beginning of the book? The reader learns Nya is 11 years old and she is in Southern Sudan.

Does the author tell the reader what Nya is doing? The author does not tell exactly what Nya is doing, only that it is hot, it will take a long time, and there will be thorns.

What can the reader infer Nya is doing based on the title of the book? The reader can infer that Nya is walking to collect water.

#### 1985

What kind of a student was Salva Dun? Salva was a good student.

At what age did he start school? Salva started school at the age of 10.

Why did he only attend school during the rainy season? Salva only attended school during the rainy season because school was only ½ mile away from his home during the rainy season. During the dry season, his family moves to an area with more water for the family's livestock.

What did he and his brothers do before they started to attend school? Salva and his brothers tended the cattle. They herded them to the grazing lands during the day.

Why didn't Salva's sisters go to school? Salva's sisters learned from their mother how to cook and take care of the home.

Why are the southern rebels fighting the northern government? The rebels are fighting for their independence from the northern part of Sudan. The government wants all of Sudan to be Muslim, the religion of the north.

Why does the teacher tell the students not to go home, but to "run into the bush"? The teacher knows the rebels will go to the village and the boys are not safe there.

Chapter 2

**2008** How does Nya spend most of her days? Nya spends most of her day making two trips to the pond for water.

#### 1985

As Salva runs away from the school what is happening behind him? As Salva runs from the school building, there is black smoke and dust where the school used to be. An airplane flies overhead.

What three questions occupy Salva's mind as they are walking away? Where are we going? Where is my family? When will I see them again?

Put yourself in Salva's place, would you have had the same questions? Answers will vary.

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At nightfall, the men tell the people to organize by village, what does Salva discover at that point, how did that make him feel? Salva discovers there are others from his village, he does not know them, but it gives him some comfort.

Who did the people encounter on the road the next afternoon? The next afternoon the people encountered a large group of rebel soldiers.

How would you have reacted if you encountered the rebel soldiers? Answers will vary.

What happened when they arrived at the rebel soldier's camp? The soldiers ordered them to get into two groups men and everyone else.

Why did Salva think he should move to the group with the men? Salva's father was an important person. His father always told him to act like a man, and to set a good example for his younger brother.

What made Salva change his mind about going to the men's group? The rebel soldier approached him with a gun. The soldier told Salva he was not a man yet.

Why do you think the women left Salva in the barn alone? Answers will vary.

#### Chapter 3

**2008** Why will it take Nya longer to get home from the water? It will take Nya longer to get home because she must carry the full container of water on her way back home.

1985 When Salva saw the woman sitting on the porch, how did he know that she was from the same tribe he was from? When Salva got close enough to the woman on the porch, he saw the Dinka scar pattern on her forehead.

What did the Dinka and Nuer tribes fight over? The Dinka and Nuer tribes fought over the land that had the most water.

How did Salva address the old woman? Salva addressed the old woman as Auntie.

What was Salva's response when the old woman asked him if he was an orphan? Salva was upset when the old woman asked him if he was an orphan, because he had a family he was trying to find.

What reason did the old woman give Salva for not allowing him to travel with her to the next village? The old woman told Salva the soldiers would not bother her, an old woman traveling alone-it would be more dangerous if Salva was with her.

**2008** What additional information does the reader learn about Nya's life in this chapter? The reader learns Nya makes two trips to the pond every day to fetch water for her family. The reader also learns Nya has a younger sister and a baby brother.

1985 Why didn't the Dinka group want to take Salva along with them? They did not want to take Salva because he is young, they think he will slow the group down and there is not enough food.

Who agreed to take Salva with the group? A man and woman take him because "he is Dinka."

Describe a typical day for Salva as a part of this group walking to nowhere. They walk, they sleep on the ground, they have only what they can scavenge from their surroundings to eat. Then they walk some more.

Why do Buksa and Salva fall behind the group? Buksa and Salva fall behind the group because they are tired and weak from hunger.

What do Buksa and Salva find in the tree? Buksa and Salva find a large beehive in the tree.

#### Chapter 5

**2008** How does Nya's life revolve around water? Answers will vary but should include Nya walks hours a day for water, her family moves for water during the dry season, she digs for water, she waits for water, her job is carrying the water.

1985 Why was the beehive such a great find for the people in the group? Finding the beehive was good for the group because the people in the group were starving.

What was the cost of feasting on the honey? The bee stings people got from all of the bees was the cost of feasting on the honey.

In what ways are Salva and Marial the same? Salva and Marial are the same age, they both speak Dinka, the same height and they have the same stride when they walk.

The author writes Salva "heard that sigh all the way to his heart." What did the author mean by that? Salva can relate to the feelings Marial has about missing his family, because Salva misses his family too.

Why is Salva so upset when Marial tells him the group is walking to Ethiopia? Salva does not know how his family will ever find him, or he will ever find his family if he is in another country.

How are the boys good for each other? Answers will vary.

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#### Chapter 6

**2008** Why does Nya prefer being at the camp? Nya prefers being at the camp because she does not have to make the two long trips to gather water every day.

What was the biggest reason Nya's mother preferred being at home? Nya's mother was afraid that when her husband and son went hunting each morning that they would run into members of the Dinka tribe and that they might be injured or killed if the two tribes started fighting.

1985 What was Salva's reaction when he saw his uncle Jewiir? Salva could not move his feet or speak when he first saw his uncle.

Why is the presence of Salva's uncle Jewiir good for the entire group? Salva's uncle had been in the army and he kept his rifle after the war. He would be able to kill food for the group to eat.

Why did everyone get sick soon after eating the antelope Salva's uncle killed? The group ate the meat too quickly after being starved for so long.

What obstacles does the group encounter in Atuot? The group is in the middle of lion country, they are constantly searching for water, they are walking miles a day and they are exhausted.

#### Chapter 7

**2008** What does the reader learn about Nya's younger sister Akeer? Akeer is sick with stomach aches, cramps, diarrhea and sometimes a fever.

What options does Nya's family have to help Akeer get better? Nya's family can wait to see if she gets better on her own or walk two days to a clinic to get her medical attention.

1985 What happened to Marial? Marial was killed and eaten by a lion.

How did the death of his friend affect Salva? Salva was gripped by fear after he learns that Marial was killed and eaten by a lion.

How does Jewiir help Salva during this time? Jewiir tells Salva he will protect him-he will shoot any lions that approach them and he will stay awake at night to guard against the lions getting into the camp.

How does the environment change as the group gets closer to the Nile River? The group can smell the water, the landscape changes to green.

Why do you think Salva was so impressed by the people making the boats? Answers will vary.

### Chapter 8

**2008** Nya's father decided they needed to carry Akeer to the clinic. What caused Akeer's illness? The contaminated drinking water caused Akeer's illness.

Why did this bother Nya? This bothered Nya because they did not collect enough water at the lake for her mother to boil it, and she knew if Akeer walked with her to get water at the pond, Akeer would have to drink water when they got to the pond to walk back home.

When Salva starts falling behind the group in the desert, what strategy does his uncle use to keep Salva walking? Salva's uncle encourages him to look at the journey in smaller parts. "You need only to walk as far as those bushes." Then after they reached the bushes, he says you need only "to walk as far as those rocks."

When the group finds other people in the desert, what choice do the people in Salva's group have to make? The group finds nine men laying on the desert sand. The men were dying or already dead of dehydration. The group has to decide whether to give them water or let them die.

What would you have done in this situation? Answers will vary.

Did some have to die for others to survive? Explain your answer. Answers will vary.

Do you think Salva would have survived the desert without his uncle's help? Explain your answer. Answers will vary.

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#### Chapter 10

**2008** Why were the two men talking to the chief of Nya's tribe? The two men in the jeep talked to the chief of Nya's tribe about drilling for water between the two trees.

What did Nya think about the idea? Nya did not believe there would be any chance of water between the two trees, because the only time water was there, was when it rained.

How will Nya's life change if they find water in her village? Answers will vary.

1985 Why did Salva's uncle tell him not to give water to the dying men in the desert? Salva's uncle told him he would not survive without his water; he was too young and not strong enough to survive without it.
