

#### **Answer Key**

Check for Understanding Flight

- 1. In what year does Charles Lindbergh become the first man to fly solo across the Atlantic Ocean without a stop? Charles Lindbergh became the first man to fly solo, without a stop across the Atlantic in 1927.
- 2. Where is Lindbergh's destination? Charles Lindbergh's destination is Paris, France.
- 3. What is the distance from New York to Paris, France? The distance from New York to Paris, France is 3,600 miles.
- 4. What is the name of Lindbergh's plane? The name of Lindbergh's plane is *The Spirit of* Saint Louis.
- 5. What two important things does Lindbergh leave behind? Lindbergh leaves his radio and his parachute behind.
- 6. Why would those two things be important? Lindbergh will not have communications without his radio and without a parachute, he cannot bail out of the plane if it starts to crash.
- 7. Why does he leave them behind? Lindbergh leaves the parachute and radio behind to remove weight from the airplane, which will give him better fuel mileage to make the flight.
- 8. If Paris is 3,600 miles away, and Lindbergh is flying 100 miles per hour, how long will it take Lindbergh to get to Paris? HINT: 3600 miles ÷ 100 mph If Paris is 3,600 miles away and Lindbergh is flying 100 miles per hour, it will take him 36 hours to fly to Paris from New York.
- 9. Lindbergh departs from New York at approximately 8:00 AM, at 4:00 PM, he flies above the coast of Newfoundland. At 100 mph, how far has he flown on his journey? Hint: 8 hours x 100 mph

Lindbergh flies 800 miles between the hours of 8:00 AM and 4:00 PM.

- 10. What did Lindbergh mount in the cockpit to see around the fuel tank he attached in the front of the plane? Lindbergh mounted a periscope so he could see around the fuel tank.
- 11. Once Lindbergh has passed over Newfoundland, what does he use to plot his course over the Atlantic Ocean? Once Lindbergh has passed over Newfoundland, he uses the stars and two compasses to stay on course.

- 12. Why does Lindbergh decide not to eat the chicken sandwiches he packed for the flight? Lindbergh does not eat the chicken sandwiches because it was easier for him to stay awake on an empty stomach.
- 13.Do you think Lindbergh was afraid when he was flying at night? Why? Answers will vary.
- 14. Why do you think Lindbergh was so happy when he saw the fishing boats? Answers will vary.
- 15. Why did Lindbergh decide not to land in Ireland? Lindbergh did not land in Ireland because he wanted to complete his dream of flying from New York to Paris, France.
- 16. How did Lindbergh feel when he finally landed the Spirit of St. Louis in Paris, France? Answers may vary, but should include dazed, excited, and tired.
- 17. What is Lindbergh's concern when he lands in Paris? Lindbergh wants to save the *Spirit* of *St. Louis*, and people are taking parts off of it. His first question is if there are any mechanics.
- 18. Do you think Lindbergh was surprised when he woke up and saw the newspaper headlines saying he was a hero? Answers will vary.
- 19. Do you think Lindbergh was an extraordinary person. Why or why not? Answers will vary.
- 20. The time in Paris, France is five hours ahead of New York. If it is 8:30 AM in New York, what time is it in Paris France? If the time is 8:30 AM in New York, the time is 1:30 PM in Paris France.





Lindbergh departs New York.


Lindbergh has completed one-third of his flight to Paris, France.



Lindbergh has been awake for over 50 hours and falls asleep at the controls over the Atlantic Ocean.








### **TIMELINE Flight of Charles Lindbergh from New York to Paris**

## **Charles Lindbergh Coloring Page**


